INVESTMENT AND RETURN OBJECTIVE

The Fund aims to deliver long term capital growth over time by offering a well-diversified portfolio investing in a broad range of domestic only asset classes in a balanced manner. The Fund will typically have high exposure to equities although some tactical asset allocation will be performed.

INVESTMENT PROCESS

The Fund invests in South African markets only across a diverse range of domestic only equities, property and interest-bearing instruments. Asset allocation is managed actively, anchored at the long-term strategic asset allocation but can be varied tactically to target outperformance of the benchmark by capitalising on signals of significant market mispricing. Where possible, a process of enhanced indexation is utilised within asset classes to deliver stable incremental alpha.

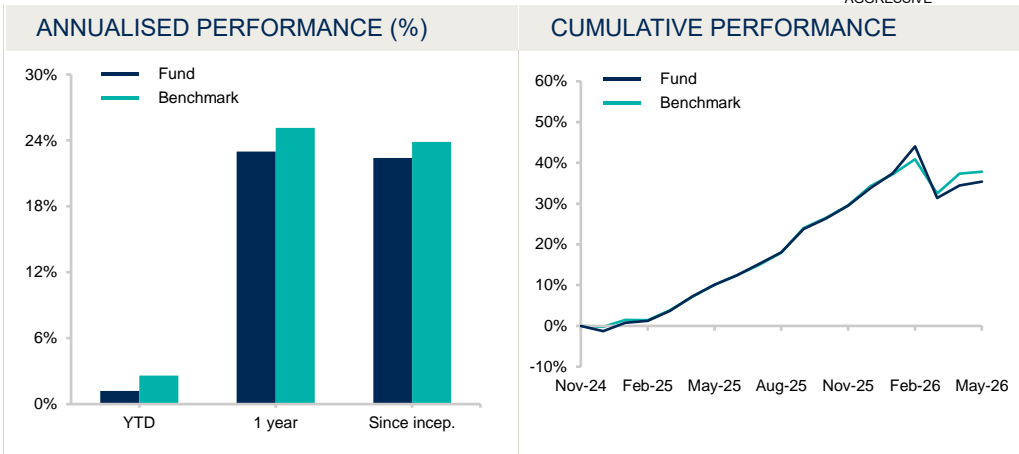
WHO SHOULD INVEST

South African investors seeking long term capital growth by investing in a typical, market related domestic balanced portfolio. The Fund is suitable for investors with a medium to long-term investment horizon and is Regulation 28 compliant.

RISK INDICATOR DEFINITION

These portfolios typically exhibit more volatility and potential for capital losses due to higher exposure to equities and exposure to offshore markets where currency fluctuations may result in capital losses. These portfolios typically target returns in the region of 5% - 6% above inflation over the long term.

FUND COMMENTARY

The Iran war that began with US and Israeli strikes on 28 February 2026 continued to dominate the global macro landscape through May, with energy markets the primary transmission channel into inflation, growth, and policy. Brent crude, which spiked above \$120 a barrel at war onset, traded in a wide range through May on intermittent de-escalation rumours but had returned to hover around \$100 a barrel by month-end with the Strait of Hormuz still largely closed. The underlying picture has deteriorated rather than improved: the International Energy Agency (IEA) reported on 13 May that the cumulative shortfall in Gulf oil deliveries since the conflict began had reached roughly one billion barrels. That gap has so far been absorbed by reduced demand, non-Gulf production increases, and a 250-million-barrel drawdown in global inventories.

European policy responses have begun to crystallise too: on 27 May Germany's state-owned Securing Energy for Europe (SEFE) signed an LNG agreement for up to 1 million tonnes per year from Canada's Ksi Lisims project - equivalent to roughly one-eighth of Germany's 2025 LNG imports - even as Berlin halved its 2026 GDP growth forecast to 0.5% on Iran-linked energy shocks. Alongside this, Germany's Economy Minister travelled to Beijing calling for a "trusting and open exchange", with explicit discussions on energy security, reliable access to critical minerals and supply channels firms can rely on – a signal that Berlin's response to the energy shock now runs through both diversification away from the Gulf and securing alternatives manufacturing-input channels with China.

For South Africa, the war's most visible footprint is on prices. Headline CPI accelerated from 3.1% in March to 4.0% in April - its highest reading since August 2024 and a full percentage point above the SARB's revised 3%-point target - driven almost entirely by energy. Core inflation, which strips out food, fuel, and energy, rose more modestly to 3.6%. The SARB, in its 29 May statement, raised its own oil price assumptions and revised its forecast path: headline inflation is now seen averaging 4.4% in 2026 and 3.7% in 2027, with a return to the 3%-point target deferred to 2028. Their response to rising prices and global uncertainty was sharper than the consensus had assumed: a 25-basis point hike to 7% on 29 May, the first increase since 2023, taken on a split vote. The committee framed the move as a "managing risk" decision rather than the start of an aggressive tightening cycle, with Governor Kganyago noting that earlier hopes for a quick end to the conflict had faded. The SARB's own Quarterly Projection Model implies one hike this quarter before rates begin easing later in the forecast horizon, however, Kganyago reiterated that decisions remain meeting-by-meeting.

Pulling these threads together, the Iran war has moved from a transient supply shock to a sustained input across global inflation, growth and policy. Its transmission is visible at every layer. Central banks are responding differently to the same shock: the SARB has hiked into a weak labour market, the IMF prefers the BoE to hold, and the BOJ is materially downgrading growth while raising its CPI forecast. The binding question for the months ahead is how long the Strait of Hormuz stays constrained - each additional month extends the inflation tail, narrows central-bank optionality, and shifts the conversation from energy prices toward embedded second-round effects.

Developed market equities were up +4.55% and Emerging Market Equities up +9.69%, while US treasuries were flat.

Locally the FTSE/JSE Allshare index lost -0.2%, while the All Bond Index Total Return gained 3.27% and the Inflation-Linked Index Total Return index was flat.

The fund was up this month due to the good performance of local bonds.

The Fund currently holds a positive view on South African equities and a neutral view on SA Bonds.

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GLOSSARY

Annualised performance: Annualised performance shows longer term performance rescaled to a 1 year period. Annualised performance is the average return per year over the period. Actual annual figures are available to the investor on request.

Highest & Lowest performance: The highest and lowest performance for any 1 year over the period since inception have been shown.

NAV: The net asset value represents the assets of a Fund less its liabilities.

Current Yield: Annual income (interest or dividends) divided by the current price of the security.

CPU: Cents Per Unit to the Glossary

Sharpe Ratio: The Sharpe ratio is used to indicate the excess return the portfolio delivers over the risk free rate per unit of risk adopted by the fund.

Max Drawdown: The maximum peak to trough loss suffered by the Fund since inception.

% Positive Month: The percentage of months since inception where the Fund has delivered positive return.

Fund Specific Risks
