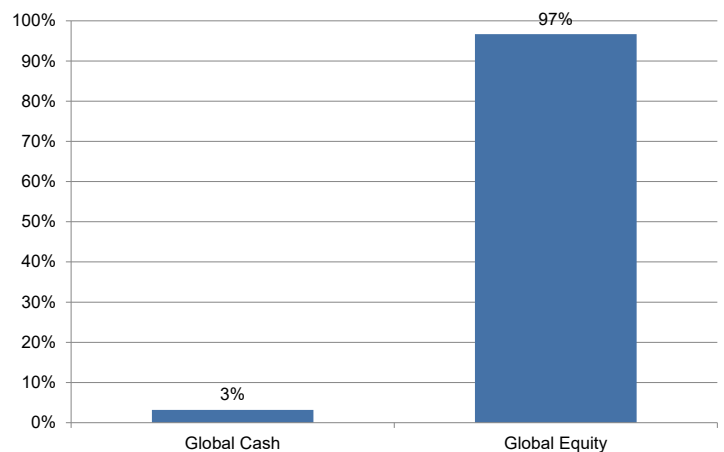

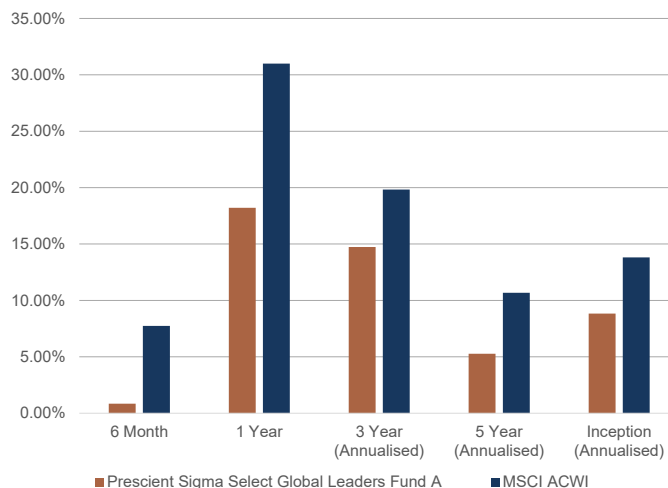


Illustration showing growth of \$1,000 invested at date of inception ¹

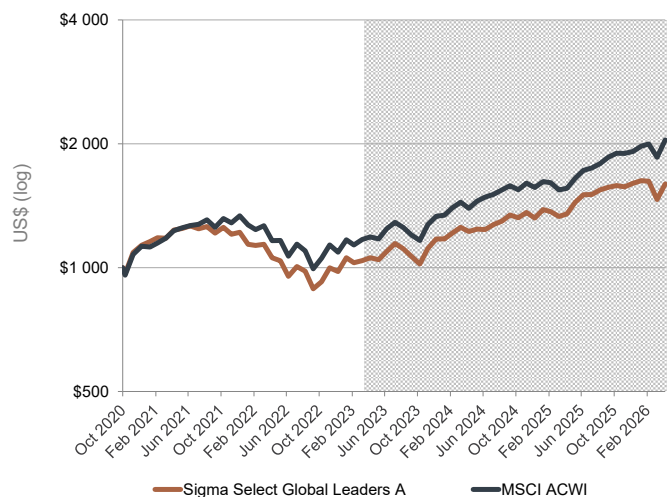
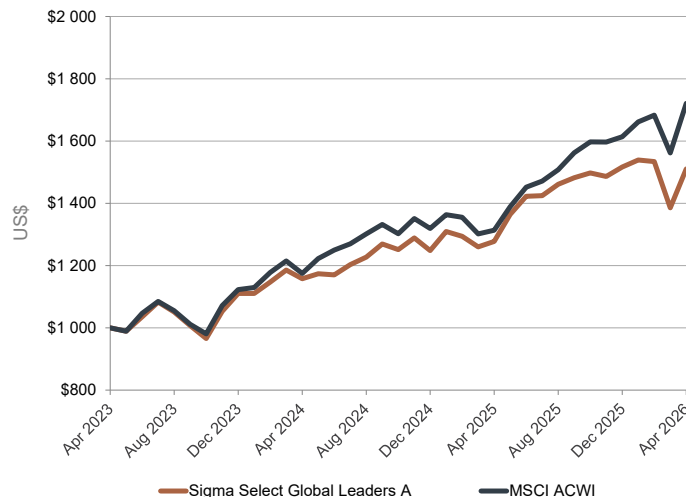


Illustration showing growth of \$1,000 invested 3 years ago

Quarterly Commentary - Q1 2026

Global equity markets declined in the first quarter of 2026 as the disinflationary tailwind supporting risk assets throughout 2025 was abruptly reversed by a geopolitically driven energy shock. Conflict in the Middle East escalated sharply in early March, resulting in the closure of the Strait of Hormuz and the disruption of global energy supply chains. The MSCI All Country World Index (MSCI ACWI) fell -3.2% in US dollar terms over the quarter.

Emerging market equities outperformed developed markets, returning -0.1% against -3.5%, respectively. This relative resilience was concentrated in January and February, driven by AI-related momentum in Taiwan and South Korea respectively. The escalation of Middle East hostilities in March reversed a portion of these gains, as risk-off sentiment and concerns over Asia's energy import dependency came to the fore.

The Sigma Select Global Leaders Fund returned -8.7% over the quarter, underperforming the MSCI ACWI by -5.5%. The quarter was characterised by a sharp rotation into energy stocks, a sector in which the Fund's underlying managers held limited exposure. Concurrently, the Fund's quality and growth-oriented holdings faced additional headwinds from market concerns over AI disruption to asset-light business models.

The Sands Capital Global Growth Fund, Lindsell Train Equity Fund, and Veritas Izoard Fund were the most significant detractors, declining -14.9%, -13.0%, and -11.9%, respectively. All three Funds had limited or no exposure to the energy sector's +34% rally during the quarter, while their holdings in high-quality growth, software, and aerospace-related businesses faced further pressure from AI disruption concerns. Importantly, all three managers reported improving underlying earnings fundamentals and view current valuations as increasingly attractive entry points. Conversely, the Orbis Global Equity Fund was the standout contributor, returning +1.2% over the quarter, with its value-oriented positioning and semiconductor holdings in Samsung Electronics and Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Company (TSMC) generating positive returns against a broadly declining market.

The first quarter's volatility has left global equities on a modestly improved valuation footing, with the MSCI ACWI forward price-to-earnings ratio declining from 19 times to 17 times, now only marginally above its long-term average.

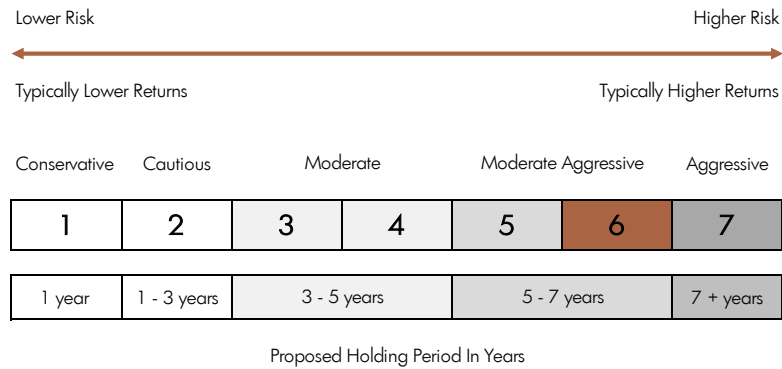
Valuation dispersion within the index, however, remains significant. The US market de-rated to 20 times forward earnings, which, while a welcome step, remains elevated relative to historical norms and continues to point to below-average prospective returns from this starting multiple. Outside the US, global equities trade on a considerably more attractive 14 times forward earnings, offering comparable growth forecasts at a meaningful valuation discount. This dynamic continues to underpin the Fund's preference for non-US large cap companies and select emerging market exposures.

As we enter Q2 2026, the Fund's regionally diversified portfolio construction, together with its continued underweight position to US equities, moderate its exposure to more valuation-rich and concentrated areas of the market, while positioning the Fund to capitalise on valuation dislocations over the medium to longer term.

Glossary Summary

Annualised performance: Annualised performance shows longer term performance rescaled to a 1 year period. Annualised performance is the average return per year over the period. Actual annual figures are available to the investor on request.

Highest & Lowest return: The highest and lowest returns for any 1 year over the period since inception have been shown.

NAV: The net asset value represents the assets of a Fund less its liabilities.

Alpha: Denoted the outperformance of the fund over the benchmark.

Sharpe Ratio: The Sharpe ratio is used to indicate the excess return the portfolio delivers over the risk free rate per unit of risk adopted by the fund.

Standard Deviation: The deviation of the return stream relative to its own average.

Max Drawdown: The maximum peak to trough loss suffered by the Fund since inception.

Max Gain: Largest increase in any single month

% Positive Month: The percentage of months since inception where the Fund has delivered positive return.

Average Duration: The weighted average duration of all the underlying interest bearing instruments in the Fund.

Average Credit quality: The weighted average credit quality of all the underlying interest bearing instruments in the Fund (internally calculated).

Dividend Yield: The weighted average dividend yield of all the underlying equity in the Fund. The dividend yield of each company is the dividends per share divided by the price.

PE Ratio: The weighted average price earnings ratio of all the underlying equities in the Fund. The price earnings ratio of each company is the price divided by the earnings per share.

High Water Mark: The highest level of performance achieved over a specified period.

Information Ratio: The Information Ratio measures the market risk-adjusted performance of an investment or portfolio. The greater a portfolio's Information Ratio, the better its risk-adjusted performance has been compared to the market in general.
