INVESTMENT AND RETURN OBJECTIVE

The Fund aims to deliver significant real returns over the long term and to outperform the ASISA category average of the South African - Multi-Asset - High Equity funds over a full market cycle by maintaining meaningful exposure to growth assets like equities.

INVESTMENT PROCESS

The Fund invests in a diverse range of assets including equities and interest-bearing instruments, both domestically and offshore. The asset allocation is anchored at the long-term strategic allocation but can be varied tactically to target outperformance of the benchmark by capitalising on signals of significant market mispricing. Where possible, a process of enhanced indexation is utilised within asset classes to deliver stable incremental alpha.

WHO SHOULD INVEST

Investors seeking significant real returns over the long term but who are cost conscious. The Fund is suitable for investors with a medium to long-term investment horizon and is Regulation 28 compliant.

RISK INDICATOR DEFINITION

These portfolios typically exhibit more volatility and potential for capital losses due to higher exposure to equities and exposure to offshore markets where currency fluctuations may result in capital losses. These portfolios typically target returns in the region of 5% - 6% above inflation over the long term.

FUND COMMENTARY

Central bank policy diverged across advanced economies toward year-end. The Bank of Japan (BoJ) struck a more hawkish tone at its December meeting, with some board members highlighting the need to reassess ultra-low interest rates. While policy tightening is expected, the BoJ is likely to proceed cautiously, with gradual rate increases. In contrast, the Bank of Canada (BoC) held its benchmark interest rate at 2.25% in early December, a widely anticipated decision. With Canada undergoing a structural adjustment marked by uneven inflation, flat domestic demand, and uncertain trade dynamics, the BoC remains focused on caution. Rate hikes are not expected until late 2026, though stronger employment trends could bring this forward slightly.

The United States experienced a turbulent year, shaped largely by Donald Trump's return to the White House and a renewed shift toward tariffs and protectionist trade policies. U.S. economic growth accelerated to an annualised rate of 4.3% in the latest quarter, up from 3.8% previously and marking the fastest pace in two years. This performance exceeded expectations and outpaced other developed economies, including the Eurozone (2.3%), the United Kingdom (1.3%), and Japan (-2.3%). Despite tighter trade and immigration policies, persistent inflation, and reductions in government spending, the U.S. economy remained resilient overall. These gains helped offset weaker areas such as subdued business sentiment - particularly in intellectual property - and a strained housing market affected by high interest rates, affordability pressures, and limited supply.

In Asia, the International Monetary Fund (IMF) raised its forecast for China's economic growth for 2026 by 0.3 percentage points to 4.5%, supported by domestic stimulus measures and lower-than-expected tariffs. The IMF expects China's average inflation to rise modestly to 0.8% in 2026 from zero in 2025. India continued its rapid ascent, surpassing Japan to become the world's fourth-largest economy with GDP of \$4.18 trillion. It is projected to overtake Germany by around 2030, reaching an estimated GDP of \$7.3 trillion.

South Africa's financial markets delivered strong gains in 2025 despite a challenging domestic economic backdrop marked by sluggish GDP growth of around 1% and unemployment near 32%.

After periods of volatility earlier in the year, U.S. equity markets finished 2025 on a strong note, with the S&P 500 rising nearly 18%, outperforming its long-term average annual return of 10.5%, and US bonds returned 6.3% over the course of the year. The MSCI World returned 21.0% and the MSCI Emerging Markets Index returned 30.6%.

The JSE All Share Index (Total Return) index surged 42.4%, supported by the global equity rally and sharply higher precious metal prices, particularly gold. Bond yields declined meaningfully leading to the local All Bond Index returning 24.2% for the year, reflecting improved investor confidence in the stabilisation of South Africa's debt position. The rand strengthened by 12.3% for 2025, ending the year at 16.56 vs the USD.

Fund performance was positive for the month, mainly due to strong positive performance from local equity.

The Fund currently holds a moderately negative view towards South African and developed market equity as well as local bonds. Our view on the rand also remains moderately negative.

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GLOSSARY

Annualised performance: Annualised performance shows longer term performance rescaled to a 1 year period. Annualised performance is the average return per year over the period. Actual annual figures are available to the investor on request.

Highest & Lowest performance: The highest and lowest performance for any 1 year over the period since inception have been shown.

NAV: The net asset value represents the assets of a Fund less its liabilities.

Current Yield: Annual income (interest or dividends) divided by the current price of the security.

CPU: Cents Per Unit to the Glossary

Sharpe Ratio: The Sharpe ratio is used to indicate the excess return the portfolio delivers over the risk free rate per unit of risk adopted by the fund.

Max Drawdown: The maximum peak to trough loss suffered by the Fund since inception.

% Positive Month: The percentage of months since inception where the Fund has delivered positive return.

Fund Specific Risks

Default Risk: The risk that the issuers of fixed income instruments may not be able to meet interest payments nor repay the money they have borrowed. The issuers credit quality is vital. The worse the credit quality, the greater the risk of default and therefore investment loss.

Derivatives risk: The use of derivatives could increase overall risk by magnifying the effect of both gains and losses in a Fund. As such, large changes in value and potentially large financial losses could result.

Transaction Costs (TC) is the percentage of the value of the Fund incurred as costs relating to the buying and selling of the Fund's underlying assets. Transaction costs are a necessary cost in administering the Fund and impacts Fund returns. It should not be considered in isolation as returns may be impacted by many other factors over time including market returns, the type of Fund, investment decisions of the investment manager and the TER.

A Feeder Fund is a portfolio that invests in a single portfolio of a collective investment scheme which levies its own charges, and which could result in a higher fee structure for the feeder fund.

Where a current yield has been included for Funds that derive its income primarily from interest bearing income, the yield is a weighted average yield of all underlying interest-bearing instruments as at the last day of the month.
