Minimum Disclosure Document & General Investor Report Investment objective

The Maestro Equity Prescient Fund will be a general equity portfolio. The Manager in selecting securities for the portfolio will seek to follow an investment policy which will secure for investors an optimum overall return, that is to say the steady growth of income and the preservation of capital in real terms. In order to achieve these main objectives, the investments to be acquired for the Maestro Equity Prescient Fund, shall comprise a mix of securities, financially sound ordinary shares, stock, financially sound preference shares, debenture stock, debenture bonds and unsecured notes as defined in the Act and the Deed, all to be acquired at a fair market value.

The Fund benchmark

The Fund will measure itself against the FTSE-JSE All Share Index. ASISA Classification: South African-Equity-General.

Legal structure

The Fund is a scheme in the nature of a trust known as a collective investment scheme. The portfolio manager is Maestro Investment Management (Pty) Ltd, an approved Financial Services Provider in terms of the Financial Advisory and Intermediary Services Act, operating under license number 739. This portfolio operates as a white label fund under the Prescient unit Trust Scheme, which is governed by the Collective Investment Schemes Control Act.

Fee structure

The maximum initial fee is 2.0%. The annual investment management fee is 1.75%. The annual total expense ratio (TER) for period ended 30 June 2023, in respect of class A was 2.28%.

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Market Overview

Global markets started the year with a bang, rising strongly until a reality check in April. Then they declined sharply on the view that the US economy was stronger than expected and consequently interest rates were unlikely to decline as fast, if at all, as originally anticipated. April returns made for sad reading.

Despite no real change in the evidence supporting the healthy US economy and consumer, markets seemed to grow comfortable with the revised outlook for the US economy and interest rates. In addition, corporate earnings remain relatively robust, notwithstanding pockets of weakness, and this proved supportive of many growth companies (again, with the odd exception). The US (+4.9%), German (+3.2%), and Swiss (+6.6%) equity markets were strong during May, helping the MSCI World index rise 4.2%. In contrast, the MSCI Emerging markets index was weak, rising only 0.3%. Brazilian (-3.0%), Russian (-4.2%), Indian (-0.7%), and Chinese (-0.6%) equity markets were all weak. An indication of the change in sentiment can be seen in the May gains of the NASDAQ, and S&P Mid and Small cap indices, which rose 6.9%, 4.3% and 4.9% respectively; these sectors typically do well in a "risk-on" environment, and May was no exception.

The Bloomberg Global Aggregated bond index rose 1.3% in May, bringing its year-to-date return to -3.3%, which stands in stark contrast to the MSCI World index return of 8.7% over the same period. During the year to end-May, global bonds have risen only 0.9% whereas the global equity markets are up 23.0%. The dollar declined 1.5% in May, and the commodity complex ended mixed; the platinum and silver prices rose 10.3% and 15.1% respectively in May but the palladium and oil prices lost 0.9% and 6.0% respectively.



Local market returns

The strong rand played a large role in market returns. The rand weakened sharply during the last days of May but had been strong during the early part of the month. When all was said and done, the rand ended virtually unchanged during May. The All Share index rose 1.0% and the All Bond index rose an estimated 0.8%. The Basic Material and Industrial index rose 0.6% and 1.7% respectively, while the Financial index lost 0.1%. So far this year, the All Share index has gained 1.6%, the All Bond index has risen 0.3%, while the Mid and Small cap indices have posted returns of -0.7% and 2.9% respectively over the same period. The year-to-date returns across the major three sectors vary considerably; the respective Basic Material, Financial and Industrial returns over this period are 6.2%, -4.9% and 3.9%.

Investment Manager comment

During May, the Maestro Equity Prescient Fund rose 1.3%, versus the 1.0% rise in the All Share index. During the year ended 31 May, the Fund rose 9.5%, ahead of the All Share index return of 6.3% over the same period.


During the month, Discovery lost 8.8%, Capitec 8.5%, and Hudaco 1.8%. On the upside, Ninety One rose 2.4%, Billiton 5.1%, Afrimat 9.4%, and Richemont 12.7%.


Historic sector allocation (% of Equity)




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Five-year cumulative performance*
