



Income Distribution:



MARKET COMMENTARY

The MSCI ACWI Index gained 1.05%. Germany and the United Kingdom were the strongest performers, rising 4.4% and 3.8% respectively, while China recorded the largest decline, falling 1.2%. The MSCI Emerging Markets Index rose 3% over the month. Within emerging markets, South Korea and South Africa posted strong gains of 9.4% and 9.1%, while Brazil and China were the main detractors, declining 1.3% and 1.2% respectively (all figures in USD).

US equities were flat in December, as year-end policy decisions and moderating macro data shaped investor sentiment. The S&P 500 edged up marginally by 0.06%, while the Nasdaq declined 0.67%. Inflation data released during the month showed headline CPI rising 2.7% year-on-year in November. Labour market conditions continued to soften, with unemployment edging higher to around 4.6%, its highest level in several years, underscoring weaker hiring momentum. Against this backdrop, the Federal Reserve cut policy rates by 25bps at its December meeting, lowering the target range to 3.50%-3.75%. This marked the third consecutive rate cut in 2025, as policymakers balanced slowing job growth against elevated inflation.

Overall sentiment remained cautious but constructive toward the year-end. European equity markets advanced 3.9% in December, supported by easing inflation pressures and stable monetary policy expectations. Eurozone headline inflation fell to the ECB's 2% target, while core inflation eased to 2.3% year on year, signalling a continued normalisation in underlying price pressures. The European Central Bank kept its deposit rate unchanged at 2% at its December meeting. Stable policy expectations and easing inflation concerns underpinned equity market strength across the region, with Germany outperforming as disinflation progressed more quickly and fiscal support bolstered confidence.

Emerging markets advanced 3% in December, with performance driven by pronounced country-level divergence. South Korea and South Africa were the strongest contributors, rising 9.4% and 9.1% respectively. In South Korea, equities benefited from a rebound in technology and semiconductor-related stocks, supported by improving sentiment around the global electronics cycle and easing inflation expectations. South African equities were boosted by a combination of lower global interest rates, improved domestic policy credibility following the sovereign rating upgrade, and strength in financials and resource-linked stocks. By contrast, Brazil and China detracted from performance, declining 1.3% and 1.2% respectively. Brazilian equities consolidated after strong prior gains, as investors reassessed the pace of future monetary easing, while Chinese markets remained under pressure amid ongoing concerns around domestic growth momentum and the property sector.

On a sector level, Information Technology was the best-performing sector over the month, where the fund's underweight detracted from relative performance. Consumer Discretionary was the worst-performing sector over the month. The fund's overweight holdings in Consumer Discretionary, Financials & Consumer Staples sectors detracted from relative performance, while stock picking in the Health Care, Materials and Utilities sectors added to relative performance.

Notable portfolio actions during December focused on increasing exposure to high-quality Brazilian businesses, with new positions in Totvs, WEG, Itaú Unibanco and Três Tentos Agroindustrial. The existing positions in Naspers and TSMC were topped up at good levels.

Notable contributors to fund performance were positions in Samsung (+52bps absolute and -14bps relative), TSMC (+42bps absolute and -7bps relative) and SK Hynix (+27bps absolute and -15bps relative). Notable detractors from performance over the month came from XP (-20bps absolute and -18bps relative), Alibaba (-19bps absolute and +11bps relative) and JD.com (-15bps absolute and -13bps relative). The fund is overweight in Kazakhstan and South Africa, where we continue to find compelling bottom-up opportunities. Conversely, the fund remains underweight India, Taiwan and China, with India and Taiwan continuing to trade at elevated valuations relative to broader emerging market peers.

Reflecting on the past year, Emerging Markets offered investors attractive returns, outperforming the S&P500 Index by 11.4%. This was the first time since 2015 that emerging markets have outperformed the US. Furthermore, investors were once again presented with ample opportunity to generate alpha for investors through country allocation, with countries like South Korea doubling over the past year, while India returned only 4.2% and Saudi Arabia declined 5%. The fund capitalised on this divergence and delivered another strong year of alpha.

The Fairtree Global Emerging Markets UCITS Fund was successfully launched on 1 December 2025, providing an offshore entry point for investors. The existing Fairtree Global Emerging Markets Prescient Fund will convert into a Rand-based Feeder Fund during February 2026.

**Glossary**

Annualised Performance: Annualised performance shows longer term performance rescaled to a 1 year period. Annualised performance is the average return per year over the period. Actual annual figures are available to the investor on request.

Highest & Lowest Performance: The highest and lowest performance for any 1 year over the period since inception have been shown.

NAV: The net asset value represents the assets of a Fund less its liabilities.

Current Yield: Annual income (interest or dividends) divided by the current price of the security.

Alpha: Denotes the outperformance of the fund over the benchmark.

Sharpe Ratio: The Sharpe ratio is used to indicate the excess return the portfolio delivers over the risk free rate per unit of risk adopted by the fund.

Sortino Ratio: A measure of the risk-adjusted return of a portfolio. It is a modification of the Sharpe ratio but only penalises the returns falling below a user specified target, or required rate of return, while the Sharpe ratio penalises both upside and downside volatility equally.

Standard Deviation: The deviation of the return stream relative to its own average.

Max Drawdown: The maximum peak to trough loss suffered by the Fund since inception.

Max Gain: Largest increase in any single month.

% Positive Month: The percentage of months since inception where the Fund has delivered positive return.

High Water Mark: The highest level of performance achieved over a specified period.

Performance Fee Cap: The maximum performance fee that can be charged over a specified period

Total Expense Ratio (TER%): The Total Expense Ratio (TER) is the percentage of the net asset value of the class of the Financial Product incurred as expenses relating to the administration of the Financial Product.

Performance fee incl. in TER (%) PF (%): The Performance Fee is a payment made to the Fund Manager for generating outperformance and is generally calculated as percentage of outperformance, often both realized and unrealized.

Transaction Costs (TC%): The Transaction Costs (TC) is the percentage of the net asset value of the Financial Product incurred as costs relating to the buying and selling of the assets underlying the Financial Product.

Total Investment Charges TIC (%) = TER (%) + TC (%): The Total Investment Charges (TIC), the TER + the TC, is the percentage of the net asset value of the class of the Financial Product incurred as costs relating to the investment of the Financial Product. It should be noted that a TIC is the sum of two calculated ratios (TER+TC).
