MONTHLY COMMENTARY

October delivered a mixed but broadly positive outcome for global markets. Developed market equities rose 2.8%, supported by easing US-China trade tensions and a strong US earnings season. However, global bonds declined slightly, with the Bloomberg Global Aggregate Bond Index down 0.3%, as credit and securitised segments weighed on performance.

Growth stocks outperformed value, driven by renewed enthusiasm for Al. Japan's TOPIX led gains following the appointment of Prime Minister Sanae Takaichi, whose pro-Abenomics stance and a weaker Yen boosted sentiment. Asia ex-Japan equities rose 4.5%, with Korea and Taiwan benefiting from trade developments. Argentina's market surged 64% after a decisive midterm election win for president Javier Milei. The S&P 500 gained 2.3%, recovering from early-month trade tensions, while the UK FTSE All-Share rose 3.7%, aided by falling Gilt yields, commodity strength, and a softer Sterling.

US inflation continued to surprise to the downside in October, with services and rent inflation showing signs of moderation. While some tariff-related passthrough was evident, its impact remained contained. This softer inflation backdrop gave the Federal Reserve room to cut rates by 25bps, bringing the target range to 3.75% - 4.00%. However, Fed Chair Jerome Powell signaled caution, suggesting further cuts are not guaranteed. Market expectations for additional easing were scaled back, with nearly two rate cuts removed from forward pricing. Despite this, US equities remained resilient, supported by strong corporate earnings, with over 80% of reporting companies beating consensus estimates.

Emerging market debt outperformed (+2.2%) amid higher real yields and a weaker Dollar. UK Gilts rallied as the Bank of England signaled a dovish shift, and Euro area bonds also performed well, with notable gains in Italy and Spain. In credit, global high yield (+0.2%) outpaced investment grade (-0.1%) due to higher starting yields and resilient investor appetite.

Commodities rose 2.9%, led by industrial and precious metals, while energy lagged. Gold and silver posted strong year-to-date gains, helping offset weakness in crude oil. Currency movements were mixed, with Sterling weakening and the US Dollar strengthening, reflecting diverging monetary policy expectations.

With US equities near all-time highs and much of the positive news priced in, the margin for error remains narrow. Diversification beyond US markets is emphasised, with a focus on balanced risk-reward opportunities and maintaining portfolio protection amid potential inflation pressures and geopolitical uncertainties.

The top-performing securities during the month were Samsung, LVMH and Thermo Fisher with the biggest detractors being Deckers Outdoor, Evolution and Novo Nordisk.


