MINIMUM DISCLOSURE DOCUMENT

INVESTMENT AND RETURN OBJECTIVE

The Fund aims to achieve healthy real returns over the long term and to outperform the ASISA category average of the South African - Multi-Asset - Low Equity funds over a full market cycle by maintaining moderate exposure to growth assets like equities.

INVESTMENT PROCESS

This Fund invests in local and offshore money market, bonds and inflation-linked bonds, property, preference and ordinary shares, derivatives and unlisted instruments to meet the investment objectives. Fund performance can be generated from taking interest rate views or duration, yield enhancement via credit instruments, asset allocation and exposure equities.

WHO SHOULD INVEST

Investors seeking real returns coupled with a stable and attractive income yield via significant exposure to the South African interest bearing markets. Although the Fund's mandate allows investment up to 40% in equities, it is expected to have lower actual exposure on average. This Fund is suitable to investors with a medium to long-term investment horizon and is Regulation 28 compliant.

RISK INDICATOR DEFINITION

These portfolios typically have moderate equity exposure or in the case of bond funds, longer duration bond exposure, resulting in some capital volatility over the shorter term. They are managed in such a manner that the probability of capital losses over one year periods is unlikely. These portfolios typically target returns in the region of 3% - 4% above inflation over the long term.

FUND COMMENTARY

As widely anticipated, the Federal Reserve announced a 25-basis-point rate cut, despite the limited availability of economic data due to the ongoing U.S. government shutdown. With the shutdown stretching to nearly a month, policymakers face increasing challenges, as the lack of timely data complicates efforts to gauge inflationary pressures driven by new tariffs and to assess whether the labour market will remain resilient as corporate costs mount. Following the Fed's move, the Bank of Japan (BOJ) maintained its policy rate at 0.5%, citing the difficulty of forecasting without U.S. economic data. Many analysts expect the BOJ to act at its next meeting in December or early next year in January. Governor Kazuo Ueda reaffirmed the bank's stance that rate hikes would depend on economic and price data aligning with forecasts but emphasised that there is no predetermined timeline. The BOJ's quarterly outlook report kept inflation projections unchanged for the current and next two fiscal years, even as inflation remains stubbornly high at around 3%. The Japanese equity market, meanwhile, enjoyed an exceptional month, with the Nikkei 225 surging 16.64%.

In Europe, the European Central Bank (ECB) kept rates steady at 2% for the third consecutive meeting, as widely expected. The decision was unanimous despite lingering concerns about eurozone inflation. The ECB now forecasts that a stronger euro and easing labour cost pressures will bring inflation down to 2.1% this year - well below the 10.6% peak seen after Russia's invasion of Ukraine in 2022, and only marginally above the 2% target. The eurozone economy grew by 0.2% in the third quarter of 2025, exceeding analysts' expectations despite stagnation in Germany and Italy. This marks an improvement from the 0.1% growth recorded in the second quarter. The Bank of England is likewise expected to hold its headline rate at 4% when policymakers meet on 6 November.

In a positive development, South Africa has been removed from the Financial Action Task Force (FATF) grey list, marking a meaningful step toward improving investor confidence and fostering a more favourable market environment - though the benefits may not materialise immediately. Nigeria, Mozambique, and Burkina Faso were also taken off of the gray list after strengthening their anti-money laundering and counter-terrorism financing frameworks in line with commitments made in February 2023. As November begins, local markets are now turning their focus to the upcoming Medium-Term Budget Policy Statement (MTBPS) later this month and the final South African Reserve Bank (SARB) Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) meeting of the year, with investors closely watching potential outcomes from both events.

The remarkable performance of gold and platinum shares this year - bolstered by Prosus/Naspers - has propelled the JSE All Share Index to record highs above 110,000 points. The rising gold price has also supported the South African rand, which outperformed many of its emerging market peers. This resilience was driven by safe-haven demand amid global uncertainty and South Africa's position as a key gold producer.

As of the end of October, the USD/ZAR exchange rate had strengthened by 0.40%. The bond market also had a robust month. The FTSE/JSE All Bond Index (ALBI) delivered a 2.56% return in the local market, while U.S. Treasuries gained 0.62% globally.

Equity markets had a solid run in October, with most indices posting positive returns, except for the Hang Seng Composite Index, which declined by -3.89%. Emerging markets outperformed their developed counterparts, with the MSCI Emerging Markets Index gaining 4.12% compared to the MSCI World Index's 1.94%.

Fund performance was strongly positive for the month due positive performance from developed and emerging market equity.

The Fund currently holds a moderately negative view towards South African and developed market equity and local bonds. Our view on the rand also remains moderately negative.

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GLOSSARY

Annualised performance: Annualised performance shows longer term performance rescaled to a 1 year period. Annualised performance is the average return per year over the period. Actual annual figures are available to the investor on request.

Highest & Lowest performance: The highest and lowest performance for any 1 year over the period since inception have been shown.

NAV: The net asset value represents the assets of a Fund less its liabilities.

Current Yield: Annual income (interest or dividends) divided by the current price of the security.

CPU: Cents Per Unit to the Glossary

Sharpe Ratio: The Sharpe ratio is used to indicate the excess return the portfolio delivers over the risk free rate per unit of risk adopted by the fund.

Max Drawdown: The maximum peak to trough loss suffered by the Fund since inception.

% Positive Month: The percentage of months since inception where the Fund has delivered positive return.

Fund Specific Risks

Default Risk: The risk that the issuers of fixed income instruments may not be able to meet interest payments nor repay the money they have borrowed. The issuers credit quality is vital. The worse the credit quality, the greater the risk of default and therefore investment loss.
